# **Course Description**

An exploration of the diversity, ecology and evolution of coastal and marine fungal species. An emphasis will be placed on making scientific collections, fungal culturing and identification of both macro- and micro-fungi associated with coastal and marine environments. Students will work to create and publish species lists with real-world implications in the discovery, documentation and conservation of fungi.

# Assignments/Assessments and Due Dates:

<u>Marine Mycology Oral Presentation</u> - Each student will be required to give a 10-12 minute talk on a topic in marine mycology of their choosing. See handout for more detailed instructions and a grading rubric.

**Social Media Project:** Students will work in groups of 3 or 4 to generate multiple social media posts each week on a given topic. See handout for further instructions and a grading rubric.

<u>Critical Evaluation of Literature</u> - Each week, students will be assigned a paper to read and evaluate. We will discuss the paper every Friday during our "Journal Club" meeting. See handout for more detailed instructions and grading rubric.

Critical Evaluations will be due on each Thursday at 11:59pm via DropBox.

<u>Quizzes</u>: Will be given *in class*, and are weighted at 10% of the total grade. These may consist of a variety of question types, including (but not limited to): multiple choice, true & false, matching, short answer, illustrations, etc. There are four (4) quizzes currently in the lecture schedule, however the instructor reserves the right to add or remove quizzes at his discretion.
